- Over \$65,000,000 in loan capital distributed

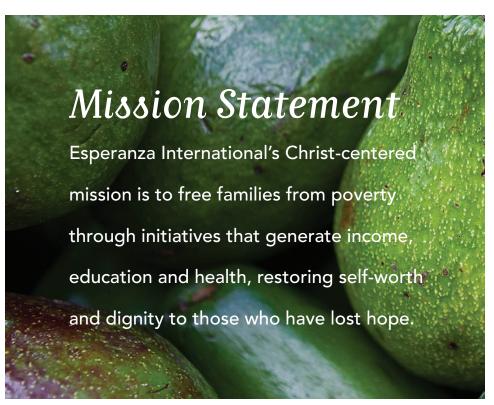

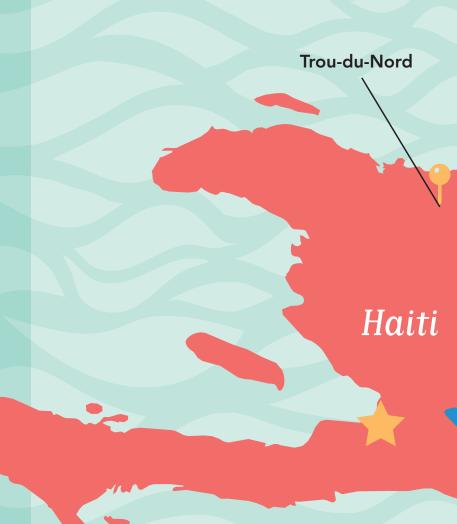
